In 2025, LPI celebrated significant legislative victories rooted in equity, dignity, and opportunity, igniting pride and confidence among our supporters. These tangible accomplishments not only highlight our collective impact today but also lay a solid foundation for transformative change in the future. Together, we are paving the way for a brighter tomorrow!

# ADVOCACY + POLICY IMPACT

## PAID FAMILY LEAVE WIN

Across education, economic equity, healthcare, and immigration, we achieved meaningful progress, directly benefiting Latino families and motivating continued support.

For the first time in over a decade, Rhode Island increased the Paid Family Leave wage replacement rate from 60% to 75% for people using it. This means that more parents can care for their children without sacrificing income; more family members can care for their sick or aging parents. These wins ensure that families, especially those with limited economic means, can remain in the workforce without sacrificing their well-being.

## Paid Family Leave Increases Between 2027-2028

After nearly a decade, the Paid Family Leave Wage has been increased in the state of Rhode Island from 60% to 70% starting in January 2027, and will increase to 75% in January 2028.

## ADVOCACY + POLICY IMPACT

### HEALTHCARE + IMMIGRATION

**Healthcare** saw critical wins to expand access, affordability, and equity for Rhode Islanders. The expansion of the Medicare Savings Program will help more low-income seniors cover out-of-pocket costs. At the same time, medical debt reform caps interest at 4% and protects families from burdens such as housing liens. **Increased Medicaid reimbursement rates**—now at 100% of Medicare for primary care—mark a major step toward stabilizing access for providers, particularly in underserved communities. Additional reforms reduce barriers to care, including new limits on prior authorization and protections that prevent providers from asking about immigration status. Finally, a \$750,000 investment in **MomsPRN** strengthens maternal and mental health support, ensuring more mothers can access timely, culturally responsive care.

**Immigration and Housing** efforts this year reflect both meaningful progress and continued urgency for Latino and immigrant families facing heightened uncertainty during this Federal administration. A major win, **Housing Protections for All**, passed both chambers, affirming that everyone deserves a safe place to call home, regardless of immigration status, and helping prevent displacement while keeping families rooted in their communities. At the same time, critical work remains. The **364-Day Misdemeanor Bill**, which would reduce the risk of deportation for minor offenses, passed the Senate but stalled in the House. *We will continue pushing for its passage.*

While not every bill crossed the finish line this year, the momentum is undeniable. Efforts like the **Student Success Act**, which would reduce in-state tuition residency requirements from 3 years to 1 year alongside continued advocacy for bilingual education and expanded healthcare access for all, reflect a growing recognition that equity *must be built into our systems, not added on later.*

*These policies are critical to ensuring that Latino students, workers, and families can fully participate and thrive in Rhode Island's future. Together, these wins move us closer to a Rhode Island where Latino communities are not just included, but prioritized, where policy reflects the realities of our lives, and where opportunity is not determined by language, income, or immigration status.*

# COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP

At a time when many in our community are experiencing fear and uncertainty, elevating and centering Latino voices is more important than ever. In 2025, we intentionally created spaces, partnerships, and opportunities that reflect our deep commitment to community voice—fostering belonging, strengthening connections, and honoring the collective power that drives our work forward.

## Bilingual Medicare Town Hall

In partnership with the Protect Our Healthcare Coalition and Progreso Latino, the Latino Policy Institute convened a bilingual Medicare town hall in Central Falls, attended by more than 20 residents and stakeholders. The session focused on the implications of H.R. 1, the Tax Reconciliation Act, for Medicare and Medicaid. Senior Policy and Research Manager Awilda Reinoso Lopez presented critical policy information in Spanish, equipping community members with a clearer understanding of how these programs are funded and what proposed cuts could mean for their care. Participants shared personal experiences navigating Medicaid and Medicare, highlighting both persistent barriers to access and the essential role these programs play in their lives. The discussion created space for community voice, connection, and informed advocacy.

## COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP POLICY CIRCLES, TERTULIAS + EMDR PROGRAM

Across tertulias, forums, and policy circles, LPI continues to ensure that its research is not only informed by community voice but also shared back in ways that build **understanding**, **connection**, and **collective action**.

### Policy Circles + Tertulias

In 2025, LPI deepened its commitment to centering Latino voices through community-driven dialogue and policy engagement. The year began with LPI's first tertulia, creating a space for community members to reflect on Latino civic engagement following the 2024 election and to collectively define what participation and political power look like in their communities.

Throughout the year, LPI hosted Policy Circles that brought together community members and decision-makers to engage directly with research and its real-world implications. A Policy Circle on Hispanic-Serving Institutions used the 2025 Latino Pathways to Success report to spark discussion among educators, students, and advocates on advancing Latino student success. Participants examined both opportunities and systemic barriers—from resource allocation to navigating institutional systems—while identifying actionable pathways for change.

LPI also convened a Mental Health Policy Circle, bringing together Latino clinicians and community members to explore culturally grounded approaches to care. The conversation reframed what it means to seek help and elevated community-informed solutions to make mental health services more accessible and responsive.

# FROM RESEARCH TO PRACTICE

## EXPANDING ACCESS TO TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE

Following the 2022 Latino Mental Health Pipeline Report, LPI partnered with the Latino Mental Health Network and Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Rhode Island to implement one of its key recommendations: expanding access to culturally and linguistically responsive mental health care.

Together, we launched a first-of-its-kind **EMDR (Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing) Training Program** for **bilingual, Spanish-speaking Licensed Independent Clinical Social Workers**. Eight clinicians completed the EMDR Basic Training, significantly increasing the availability of specialized trauma-informed care for Spanish-speaking communities in Rhode Island, where such access had previously been extremely limited.

Participating clinicians have collectively served more than 200 clients, including youth, adults, and veterans. They report increased confidence and capacity to deliver EMDR, a critical tool in treating trauma. This initiative demonstrates the power of moving from research to implementation—strengthening the behavioral health workforce while expanding equitable access to care. LPI remains committed to advancing solutions that translate community-informed research into meaningful, lasting impact.

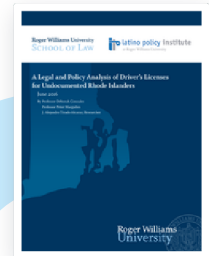

## ESTAMOS AQUÍ 20 YEARS OF IMPACT

Our work has consistently helped drive critical conversations and policy change across the state.

In **2013**, our education report highlighted growing funding inequities impacting urban school districts serving multilingual learners, helping catalyze statewide discussions and action around educational equity.

In **2017**, our report examining the economic and public safety impacts of providing driver's licenses to undocumented Rhode Islanders became a key resource in the advocacy efforts that ultimately led to the successful passage of statewide legislation in **2022**.

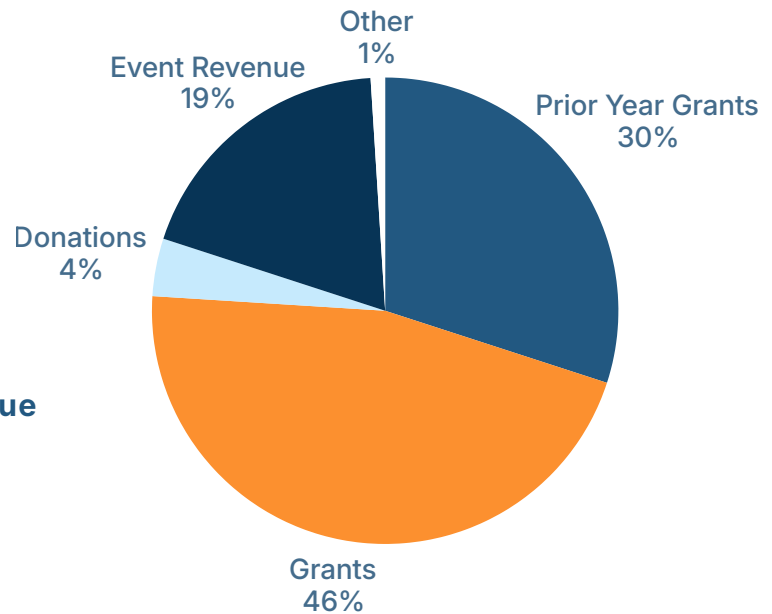
